(There were 10 of us – I'm the second oldest). My heart goes out to those who are in similar circumstances – not necessarily abusive homes but some form of abuse that drove them to where they are.

I can say that what got me through was the couple of churches I attended for a short time as a child that brought people into my life who really cared about me. I never forgot them which led to a relationship with Jesus that saved and healed me.

I want the women in the jail to recognize that there are those who love and care about them too. So, sitting down with women in the jail and bringing the Word to them is important. It's important too for them to hear that they do not have to be victims forever. There are choices that are up to them to make – how do they know about choices unless someone brings the Word to them.

It's so rewarding to continue contact with someone who I met in jail ministry. I'll tell you about one of them. She wanted to attend the church I was going to but needed a ride. Since I drove by her residence on my way to church, I told her I would pick up her and her mom. For several years they attended every service and function that they could. I learned about how they were both estranged from her 4 children and her grandchildren. It was heartbreaking watching her try to rebuild those relationships and we prayed together many times for several years. I'm happy to report that the family has come together, and they are rebuilding what had been lost over the years. Is there anything greater or more blessed than that? She told me that the jail ministry brought her to salvation and restoration. Praise God!!

No matter where life leads each woman after she leaves jail – she will never forget the Bible Studies, people who cared about her, or the Word she heard. It gives her a chance to lay a new foundation if she makes that choice. **Rosa Puma**

SUPPORT-

My name is Nora Knapik, and I am a member of the Blue Circle in the Circles of Support program. I joined Circles of Support because in the family I grew up in, service to others was a part of daily life.

I have spent most of my life in a helping profession. When I was a teenager, I decided to go into nursing, and became a registered nurse at the age of 20. I retired early from nursing to open and run a Bed and Breakfast with my husband in the beautiful Driftless area. It was a kind of ministry as we provided a space for people to relax and get back in touch with themselves and nature. Everyone needs space to breathe and heal. We did that for 14 years until we retired and moved to La Crosse.

Over the years my sister, who has been very involved with the effort to eliminate the death penalty. She is a Catholic nun and a friend of Sister Helen Prejean, who is in the same order of nuns. Due to my sister's influence, the issues of social justice have been hanging around in my brain and in my heart. After I retired, I had the opportunity to take spiritual

After I retired, I had the opportunity to take spiritual training with a Medicine Woman in New Mexico for 3 years. I became aware of so much! In the Medicine, everything is a circle because we are one. There is no hierarchy. I learned tools to help stay in balance, and learned how important it is to help others stay in balance. To put it simply, helping a person stay in balance helps all of us. I also learned the importance of only taking action that "affirms life".

Now having integrated these concepts, I wanted to find a way I could help. I found out about Circles of Support through an acquaintance, now a friend, and have been part of this program for about a year and a half. I have made new friends, and work with a wonderful group of caring people. I feel strongly that what we do together helps others to stay in balance and affirms their life.
