BETTER FUTURE FOR ALL As a new resident of La Crosse, I was

asked by a church friend to consider serving on the Jail Ministry Board. I thought long and hard about my choice as I looked at the application forms. Previously I have volunteered with literacy students, immigrants applying for citizenship, those living with mental illness and persons in need of affordable housing. I taught English as a Second Language in an IL county jail where I came to know people who were lacking job skills and the support of family or friends.

I remember one student who was released but begged to return to jail just so somebody would know him by name. My pen pal in a Texas prison writes that he was born to a drug-addicted mother and an absent father. Because he lived with different foster families and moved often, stability and role models were lacking. Consequently, like many incarcerated individuals, he had little experience deferring gratification in favor of working for long-range goals. Now he lives a life full of regret and depression. I believe our faith calls us to reach out to the marginalized, the ignored and the forgotten. These people of worth long to be useful respected members of our community.

The La Cross Jail Ministry Board works to connect inmates to resources. I have found that everyone on the board has unique gifts to share. I am honored to be part of this group that works tirelessly to ensure a better future for all in our community. 
An email sent to Pastor Jerry Hatlevig of Connect Church and a volunteer for La Crosse Jail Ministry from someone formally incarcerated our jail:

the Gospel. I have 2 sermons per quarter at my local nursing home, and lead Men's Recovery every week. I just wanted to reach out and thank you for taking the Grace to bring the Gospel back into my life.... in the La Crosse County Jail.

2023 La Crosse County Jail Statistics:

- The average daily population in the jail was 118.
- The average length of stay in the jail was 9.55 days. There were 90 people confined for an average of 153.26 days.
- There were 3707 bookings (officially arrested & taken into custody).

La Crosse Jail Ministry Statistics from April 1, 2023, to April 1, 2024:

- 1695 supply bags were filled for residents.
- 132 services were provided by volunteers.
- 104 studies were provided by volunteers.
- 5 circles of support were working to mentor people transitioning out of jail or prison.

WHY I SERVED LA CROSSE JAIL MINISTRY

Friends, I am so grateful to have reached the milestone of five years of service to the La Crosse Jail Ministry. This service has affected my life in so many positive ways.

What is the La Crosse Jail Ministry, and what do we do for the residents of our county jail? You can imagine how lonely and depressing it must be to be incarcerated. In many cases, the resident doesn't know how long they will be kept there, until their case is adjudicated. Some will be destined for release, others for further detention in other institutions.

We are so lucky to be free, to leave our homes any time we wish, to walk down the street, to stop at the store, to visit friends and family. When I first visited our jail 5 years ago, I was struck with how stark and isolating the place is. I always thought to myself, "How can we help these people and give them hope for a better future?"

Our ministry supports resi-dents, from the moment they are incarcerated, throughout the pe-riod they are in jail, and then help them rejoin "normal" life once they are released. Like many other religious leaders in our community, I have experienced the joy of meeting with residents as a group. These services and studies certainly can get them thinking positive and optimistic thoughts. More than anything else, it can give them HOPÉ. These meetings also provide an opportunity to connect them to faith communities.

I am grateful for the five years I have served at the Jail Ministry, and for the incredible volunteers who provide their time and energy to people who are truly in need. DERECH ERETZ

The La Crosse Iail



This Hebrew phrase, which literally means "the way of the land" (commonly translated as "the way of the world"), demands us to treat all of humanity with dignity and respect, demonstrating genuine care and concern for the welfare of everyone without regard to their status in life. The Jewish services at the La Crosse County Jail reach inmates probably at one of the lowest points in their lives without pressuring them to conform to a set of rigid theological beliefs as Judaism places a strong emphasis on right action in the form of good deeds and far less emphasis on right belief. During Jewish services, we share with inmates the Hebrew scriptures, Jewish prayers, and the diversity of Jewish thought and practice that together serve to support the ideals of human dignity, universal justice, equality, and freedom. In fellowship, we share the joy and goodness found in God's creation and God's desire that each of us experience a life filled with peace, purpose, and joy – a life of meaning that is achieved when we love and care for each other without conditions. For inmates, many of whom have lacked the social supports needed to succeed in life, Jewish services provide a supportive forum during which they are free to envision a hope-filled future lived in community with others.
