# LA CROSSE JAILERS

La Crosse County's jailers play a critical role—helping maintain public safety while supporting people in the jail, many of whom face serious mental health and substance use challenges.

"We deal with a lot of mental health issues the public doesn't see," says Jailer Tim Shelton, who has worked for the County for 13 years.







"Every day brings a new challenge. We do the best we can, but we're not mental health professionals."

The jailers perform an important service for the public, but it's work that often goes unnoticed. "We're kind of forgotten about," says Tonya Siddons, who has 25 years of experience at the La Crosse County Jail. "It can be very

stressful at times, but having good coworkers pulls us through." Kari Anderson, who has been a jailer for 17 years, agrees: "Great coworkers help you make it through, day by day."

## WHY I SERVE | CHAPLAIN'S

I decided to serve mainly with keeping in mind the Gospel St. Matthew 25:36-40, "You did it to me." However, I myself have experienced incar-

ceration most of my youth, even being detained in the La Crosse facility. Therefore I had that personal draw to serve there somehow.

I serve at the La Crosse County Jail Ministry by assisting the Catholic Men's Group on the scheduled Sundays, specifically reading the Gospel of the Day according to the Church's Calendar. I approach the study based on the traditional practice of Lectio Divina, Sacred Reading, while remaining faithful to the Church's substantial interpretation of the Holy Scriptures.

What moves me or inspires me when serving at jail is the Holy Spirit moving in us as a group and the joy that we receive when dwelling on God's Word.

What I believe that I have gained through the studies with the inmates is wanting to learn and imitate their child-like disposition to receive enlightenment by meditating on the Scriptures.

The advice that I give to those considering serving in jail ministry is primarily to include it in their prayers of discernment and to seek advice from a close friend. Whatever the decision, a humble request is to please pray for our ministry and the inmates, that we bear much fruit for God's Kingdom.
